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3. U of T PM&R receives three research prizes at 2017 CAPM&R meeting



The project was entitled, "Optimizing Processes for Reporting Stroke Rehabilitations in Patient Driving Status at Toronto Rehabilitation Institute: A Lean Quality Improvement Project." Given that five residents had worked on the project, there needed to be a fair process for deciding who would present at the meeting. After an intense round of rock, paper, scissors, Pam Joseph won the competition and was chosen to present on behalf of the group, which she did very well.
